- Gilmanton: Evolution of a New Hampshire Hill Town from 1880 to 1940 by Pat Clarke, a time in which Gilmanton ceased to be a manufacturing town and saw a major decline in its agriculture and population. (\$20.00)
- Gilmanton Summers by Jane Cumming, records her recollections of summers in Gilmanton in the early 20th century. It is illustrated with photographs from the period. (\$20.00)
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- Gilmanton, My Home Town Memoirs of Louise Place Shurbert Illustrated with photos from the museum collection. (\$20.00)
- History of Gilmanton, NH to 1875 by William Badger, picks up where Lancaster left off. In addition to information on the industry and politics of the time, it includes information of genealogical interest. (\$10.00)

- *The Academy The* building, now housing the Town offices and meeting rooms, is the third on the site. (Booklet) (\$5.00)









~ 2025 Summer Program Series ~

(All programs take place on the Fourth Tuesday of the Month [unless noted], May through October)

Every Summer the Society hosts a series of FREE programs, open to the public, that bring History to Gilmanton. The topics may vary from individuals/groups who made a difference, to unusual books related to the region's history. The Society also presents at least one program focused on an aspect of Gilmanton's history.

Tuesday, May 27th, 6:30 PM Old Town Hall, Gilmanton Iron Works Robert Frost on the NH Farm: Farming in 1900 as Told by the Poet

While it makes spoken words sing like sauntering music, Robert Frost's poetry can also help us appreciate the rigor of life on a New England farm in the early 20th century. (Hint: It was hard.) In an exploration of both NH history and Frost's poetry, author and poet Jeffrey Zygmont



Tuesday, June 24th, 6:30 PM Old Town Hall, Gilmanton Iron Works A Walk Back in Time: Secrets of Cellar Holes

Northern New England is full of reminders of past lives such as stone walls, and old foundations. What forces shaped settlement, and later abandonment, of these places? Adair Mulligan explores the rich stories to be discovered in what remains behind. See how one town has set out to create an inventory of its cellar holes. Such a project can help landowners know what to do if they have or discover archaeological sites on their land.

Explore the beauty of the Tom Howe Conservation Area; hike the Urner Trail to Meetinghouse Pond; and explore Gilmanton's agricultural



heritage. During colonial times, flax was grown, retted and processed at this site. Come see members of the Flax and Linen Community demonstrate the processing of flax-to-linen as it was done over 200 years ago.

Songs of Emigration: Storytelling Through Traditional Irish Music

Through live music (on fiddle and guitar) Jordan Tirrell-Wysocki relays adventures, misadventures, and emotions experienced by Irish emigrants as they left Ireland. Songs selected focus on the reasons for leaving, and/or what happened upon arrival (e.g. drafted into Civil War's Union Army). Songs also explore the universal feeling of home-

sickness as an Immigrant in a new land. Song history/context, are interspersed with Irish tunes.

Don't Worry, I'm Just Your Town Perambulator.

NH Law requires all towns to perambulate their boundaries/town lines once every 7 years.
Perambulate? Learn what, how, who, and why it is necessary.
Answers to these questions, plus quirky tales, adventures and unexpected surprises while walking NH town

boundary lines, will be shared.

Tuesday, October 28th, 6:30 PM Old Town Hall, Gilmanton Iron Works
The Capital Crime of Witchcraft:
What the Primary Sources Tell Us.

Margo Burns explores "witch" prosecutions in 17th Century New England, using facsimiles of primary source manuscripts such as...first formal complaints to arrest warrants, indictments of formal charges to death warrants, and the



reversals of attainder and rescinding of excommunications years after the fact. Particular focus is placed on Salem witchcraft trials of 1692 & 1693, when 19 people were hanged and one crushed to death. It also examines other cases against women in NH, and CT.
